

Friends earn library thanks for helping to provide services

More than 13,000 East Lansing Public Library patrons benefited through contributions from the Friends of the East Lansing Public Library during the fiscal year ending on April 30, 2014.

Among the programs made possible, in part, through our contributions of about \$18,000 were movies including the *The Great Gatsby*, *Gravity and Monsters University*, shown to about 600 people.

Another 900 patrons took part in programs celebrating African American History Month, in writing center groups, in English language practice, in a Spanish conversation group, in French Club and Arabic Club.

Book Clubs, including Books on Tap, allowed readers to discuss Annie's Ghost, The Introvert Advantage, The Life List and Slaughterhouse Five among other books.

About 2,300 young adults attended after school programming as well as worked on duct tape creations and gingerbread creations.

 $More than \ 8{,}300 \ children \\ took part in programs including$

summer tutoring, claymation animation, code camps, LEGO programs, Story Time and got homework help.

Other programs and items included the summer reading program, One Book, One Community author reception and contributions to the Books, Bites and Bids. Friends also supported the library's 90th birthday celebration

and a volunteer recognition luncheon.

Friends also purchased two benches for the art gallery, bought play wallboards for the children's room and earned more than \$2,000 through a

One Book, One Community announces 2014 selections

The City of East Lansing and Michigan State University recently announced the selection of three voices on race in America as the 2014 One Book, One Community program.

The Friends of the the East Lansing Public Library has donated \$3,500 to the program again, continuing our cosponsorship of this wonderful community program.

According to a release from the City of East Lansing, MSU and the East Lansing Public Library, the One Book, One Community is offering students and community a menu of literary and cinematic works, including a graphic novel, a memoir and a film.

The graphic novel, "March Book One" by U.S. Congressman John Lewis, Andrew Aydin and Nate Powell, has been called a vital, first-hand account of Lewis's lifelong struggle for civil and human rights.

The memoir, "The Grace of Silence," by NPR contributor and the award-winning journalist Michele Norris, explores her family's racial legacy and discusses how America talks about race.


The film, "Fruitvale Station" by director Ryan Coogler, is based on a true story of a 22-year-old black man who was killed by a Bay Area Rapid Transit police officer on a subway platform in Oakland, California.

Lewis, Norris and Coogler will visit East Lansing for three community events this fall. Community members are encouraged to read the books and watch the film.

The program is coordinated in conjunction with MSU's year-long Project 60/50, which commemorates the 60th anniversary of the Brown v. Board of

Books, Bites and Bids raises \$19,000

for new digital maker lab

With help from many organizations, businesses and individuals including the Friends of the East Lansing Public Library, \$19,000 was raised for a new digital maker lab at the library.

The funds were collected during the third annual Books, Bites and Bids event held in April. The Friends donated items for bid in the silent auction.

The money will allow the library to purchase the digital maker lab by the end of the summer. The lab will provide community members with a place to innovate, create and produce high quality digital documents, movies, sound recordings, art as well as other items.

The lab will include a 3 D printer and high end computers that allow use of software like Photoshop and video and music editing and digital design programs. The computers will use large monitors and different input devices such as drawing pads and 3 D scanners.

Library Director Kristin Shelley has been quoted as saying that the digital maker lab "will be a place where patrons can do everything from learning a new piece of software to creating a PR package for a new business or making a digital collage of family photos or writing and recording a track of music. We are excited to add this new, innovative space to the library. It would not be possible without the tremendous support of the community."

At the Books, Bites an Bids, patrons were treated to music by the Now Know quartet and Josh White Jr. Grand Grillin' provided food and the Grand Traverse Pie Company donated a king-sized pie.

New public services librarian sees long term need for libraries

Her smile lights up the room.

A Lansing native, Annelise Gordon is the new Public Services librarian at the East Lansing Public Library.

She began her new job, the contours of which are still evolving, in March.

Calling herself Annie, Ms. Gordon helps gather books for a reading club called Books on Tap that meets at Jimmy's Pub on the second Tuesday of each month. She works at the reference desk and is beginning to archive local historical documents. She has certification in archival administration and earned a master's in library science from Wayne State University.

"We want to have the local historical material displayed and used rather than rotting away in cabinets," she said.

She is coordinating her work with that performed by Teen

Anne
Librarian Shannon Lake and with Jill Abood, head of Programming and Outreach Services.

In a time when the future of books is being debated, Annie said she believes paper books will be around for the foreseeable future even though e-book usage is growing.

"I think there is a role for both. Even with digital devices increasing in use, libraries will always have a strong community role," she said. "The idea of a library will never go away. Even if libraries eventually only exist digitally, you will always be able to get access to material at your local library not available cheaply or easily elsewhere."

Annie said she uses her e-reader when she travels but "for me, there's nothing like holding a book in my hands." She said East Lansing's library has done a "particularly good job in embracing technology rather than standing back. We have been at the forefront."

She comes from a "library family" in which her mother is a processing librarian at the downtown branch of the Capital Area District Libraries. Annie has volunteered in libraries since she was 14. Most recently she has worked at the Lansing Campus Davenport University and the South Campus of the Lansing Branch of the Capital Area District Libraries.
